## Qualified Juniors Plan Graduation This Spring

Can CVHS students really graduate from high school in only three years? The answer is "yes" if they fulfill all the high school requirements and have definite plans for the following year.

The procedure to apply for early graduation involves writing a petition to Mr. Tubbs, the principal, stating reasons why you desire an early graduation. You must also have your parents and counselors write a similar letter approving your petition.

After evaluating the three letters, Mr. Tubbs makes his final decision based mainly on the following factors: whether or not the student has made definite plans to attend college or go to work, an absence of behavioral or attendance problems and grades.

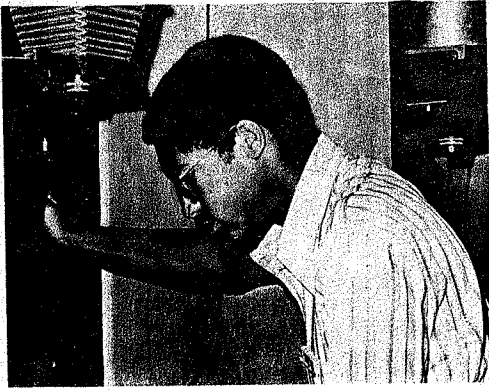
Some of the students applying for an early graduation stated, "I would be wasting my time to remain another year in high school." "I would like to become a doctor so I want to complete my high school education as soon as

possible," and "I feel I have gotten everything I can out of high school."

"When I recommend a student for early graduation I look at each student individually and then I make my decision based on the student's maturity, and his educational reasons," stated Miss Vaz, junior counselor.

"The juniors who do graduate as the end of this year will be able to participate in the graduation ceremonies, but not the senior activities," stated Mr. Tubbs.

Mr. Tubbs disclosed that he would decide which juniors could graduate this spring within the next two weeks.

We arrived at the Oakland headquarters for Pete Stark early one blustery, rainy, Wednesday morning for our 9:00 press conference with Mr. Stark.

As other reporters began to arrive, we gathered our courage and entered the small, run down building.

Our invitation stated that we would be served a free "Continental Breakfast." Imagining a seven course affair, we were disappointed to find only coffee and rolls.

When the 20 reporters from various high schools and college newspapers were seated, the tall, attractive congressional candidate began to address the group.

He gave a brief outline of his views on various subjects and then opened it up to a question and answer period.

Some of the issues covered were ecology, the space program, and believe it or not—Women's Lib or Women's Liberation as one reporter stressed.

Although approximately five men will be competing in the primary for the Democratic ticket, Stark feels it is "clearly" a race between himself and the incumbent George P. Miller.

He hopes to open the lines of communication between the 8th district and Congress, which he feels Miller has closed.

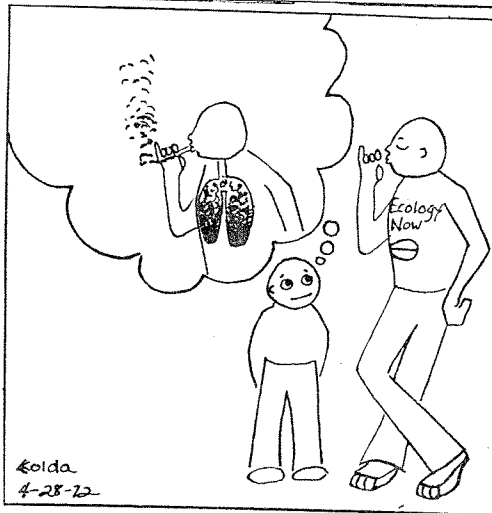
Stark refers to himself as a "peace activist." He believes we must "withdraw all American forces from Indochina as soon as possible, reduce defense spending, and intensify nuclear arms negotiations."

He hopes to "eliminate poverty through income maintenance, job training and creation, early education, improved social security."

On conservation, he believes that polluters should be treated like other criminals and "strong sanctions" should be taken against them.

Stark believes that we should start planning now "to accommodate the population growth expected by the year 2000."

He also stated that Congressman Miller has kept himself hidden from view and has "failed to keep pace with the changing attitudes in America, and especially his own district. Before this campaign is over, however, his name—as well as mine—will be widely known, and people of the 8th District will have a clear choice."

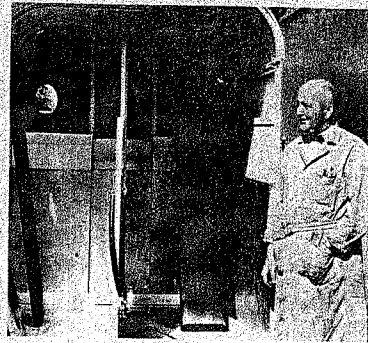

## Flag Salute Questioned

What does liberty and justice mean to you? What does the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag mean to you?

These are just two of the questions that will be included on a questionnaire presented to the students, faculty members, staff and administration of Castro Valley High School along with a copy of the newly proposed (unofficial, thus far) pledge written by one of the nation's most renowned psychologists. The survey will be distributed in early May.

Toni Monteiro, junior, has

initiated this questionnaire since during "Ad" period in most of the classes the Pledge of Allegiance is not recited. When asked why she was concerned about revising the pledge, she replied, "I think it's important. I'd like to be able to say the Pledge with pride." She believes that she is contradicting her beliefs by reciting something that she feels is untrue. She further believes that in this "free country" not all people are really free due to racial discrimination or religious beliefs. In

this country, there isn't "liberty and justice for all" because of the same reasons. "I just think it's a farce to say something that's not true," she commented.

After the questionnaire was reviewed by Administrative Council, it was suggested that certain changes be made in the phraseology of some of the questions so as not to conflict with educational rules, regulations or codes. The questionnaire will soon be placed in the hands of everyone at CVHS.

## Phone Abuse Restricts Use

Due to the student abuse of the Castro Valley High School intercom system, the administration has renewed its strict policy of phone use.

Students who call friends out of classes on false pretenses and counselors who use the phones excessively to communicate with students are among those who have helped bring a halt to students using the classroom phones, according to school officials.

## The Great Deceiver Can Kill

Ignorance may be bliss in most cases, but when it comes to venereal diseases, ignorance may be deadly. And according to a recent report by the American Social Health Association, quite a few people in the United States are lacking the proper V.D. information.

The report contained statistics regarding the reported rates of infection syphilis and gonorrhea in 160 American cities and counties. Dr. John C. Cutler, a director of the American Social Health Association, said that there was an increase, nationally, of 15.6 per cent over the year before.

The following is a quiz on some basic venereal diseases information. The answers are at the bottom.

1. Since syphilis germs can live a long time outside the body, it is possible to contract it in several ways.
2. Sores and rashes can always be found on people who have syphilis; therefore people usually know when they are infected.
3. The symptoms will go away even if a person does not have the proper medical treatment for the disease.
4. If a pregnant woman has syphilis, she can transmit the disease to her unborn child if she does not receive treatment early enough.
5. Syphilis can be inherited and passed on for generations.
6. Once a person has syphilis and the disease is cured in the early stage, he can never get the disease again.
7. Some people have syphilis yet may never have outward signs of it.
8. If syphilis is not found and treated, it may cause blindness, deafness, insanity

ease or even death.

9. Gonorrhea is often caused by lifting heavy objects (strain).

10. If gonorrhea is not found and treated, it may progress to arthritis, sterility, heart problems or serious pelvic disorder.

11. The symptoms of gonorrhea will go away, even though the person is not cured of the disease.

12. If a person has gonorrhea once and is cured, he will never get it again because he has become immune to the disease.

13. It is possible for a female to have gonorrhea and not know it.

14. If gonorrhea is not treated, it will develop into syphilis.

15. Syphilis and gonorrhea are almost always acquired by sexual contact with an infectious person.

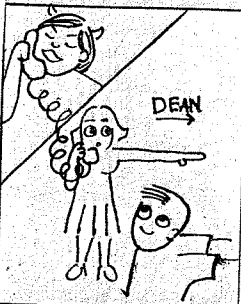
16. It is possible for a person to have syphilis and gonorrhea at the same time.

17. A blood test can be used to diagnose both gonorrhea and syphilis.

18. Syphilis and gonorrhea are frequently acquired by contact with any object that an infectious person has used, such as toilet seats, lipsticks and towels.

19. People with syphilis or gonorrhea have a distinctive appearance, making it possible to tell an infected person just by looking at him.

20. Both syphilis and gonorrhea can be cured by the proper medical treatment.

**Mitch Kim** stands only five feet four inches. But his diminutive stature has been an asset to him as he has become the starting second baseman for the varsity nine.

Mitch blasted a bases-loaded triple in the Easter Tournament to pull out a last minute victory over Ygnacio Valley. In league play, he has shown remarkable defensive talent and has been a threat on the bases. Says Mitch, "Baseball is my number one sport. I quit basketball to devote my time to practicing."

**Muscular Greg Severs** is the Spartan's top discus thrower, tallying one first and three seconds already this cinder season. To remain at the top of the heap, he lifts weights every day and is one of the track team's hardest workers. "Mr. Guest really helps me to improve my form," says modest Greg of his mentor. A towering 6'6", Severs has very long arms which could make him one of the area's finest. "Grog", as he is affectionately dubbed, is also a top shot-putter.

Taking a 4th place in the league meet as a freshman, tanker **Kevin Eastman** has high hopes for success this year. Swimming the backstroke, 200 freestyle, and relays when needed, Kevin is one of the mainstays of the powerful C.V. mermen. This meet is preliminary to the North Coast section finals scheduled May 1, 2 and 13.

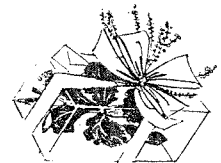

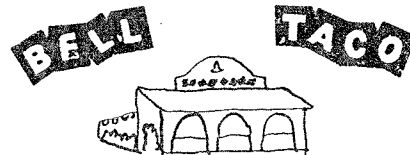
